

# House Committee Musical Chairs In Anticipation of the 118<sup>th</sup> Congress

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## Overview

### Current Margins and the Electoral Map in the House

- House Democrats currently hold a 220-212 advantage with three vacant seats. 218 seats are needed to control the chamber. Every two years, all 435 seats in the House are up for election.
- The midterm elections will be held on November 8, 2022. The 118th Congress will begin with reelected and newly elected Members beginning two-year terms on January 3, 2023.
- As of today, 69 sitting Members have announced they will not be returning to the 118th Congress. Retirements, plans to seek a different office, or primary defeats have been announced by 39 Democrats and 30 Republicans, including five Democratic committee chairs (Budget; Ethics; Oversight and Government Reform; Science, Space, and Technology; and Transportation and Infrastructure) and five Republican ranking members (Ethics; Homeland Security; House Administration; Ways and Means; and Select Committee to Investigate the Jan. 6th Attack on the US Capitol).
- Races to watch because they lean Democrat, lean Republican, or are toss-ups are coded in this document based on analysis from leading political pundits, including *270 To Win*, *Real Clear Politics*, *the Cook Political Report*, and *Sabato's Crystal Ball*.
- As the margins in the House become clear and we learn more about committee ratios, we plan to expand this document to reflect seats that parties may gain or lose on each committee, as well as current committee members who may be at risk of losing a seat due to changing committee ratios.
- Closer to the elections, we will also begin tracking Members who may be looking to switch their committee assignments in the new Congress.
- There are reports that if Republicans win control of the House, GOP leadership may consider creating universal chamber rules that would limit committee leadership to three terms. This would impact long-serving Democratic committee leaders, including Reps. Bennie Thompson (D-MS) of **Homeland Security**, Adam Smith (D-CA) of **Armed Services**, Maxine Waters (D-CA) of **Financial Services**, Frank Pallone (D-NJ) of **Energy and Commerce**, and Bobby Scott (D-VA) of **Education and Labor**. That being said, in several cycles over the last decade, Republican leaders have proposed to relax party conference rules. Without an official comment from Minority Leader Kevin McCarthy (R-CA), it is questionable if this policy would be pursued.

### Special Elections

- Rep. Devin Nunes (R-CA-22) announced his retirement in December 2021. Following a primary on April 5 with neither candidate claiming a majority, Republican Connie Conway won the special election runoff on June 7 to serve the remainder of the term. California is

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losing a district, and the current District 22 is largely being absorbed by neighboring districts, meaning Conway will only be in the seat for a few months.

- Rep. Jim Hagedorn (R-MN-1) passed away on February 18. Republican Brad Finstad secured won the special election on August 9 to serve the remainder of the term.
- Rep. Don Young (R-AK-AL) passed away on March 18. A top-four special election primary was held on June 11. In a surprise win, Democrat Mary Peltola won the special election on August 30 and will carry out of the rest of the late Congressman's term. She will also appear on the ballot in November.
- Rep. Filemon Vela (D-TX-34) resigned effective March 31. The historically Democratic seat was won by Republican Mayra Flores in a special election on June 14. She will carry out the rest of his term. Flores also won the Republican primary for the district on March 1. She will face Rep. Vicente Gonzalez (D-TX), who opted to run in District 34 instead of his current District 15, won the Democratic primary and will face Flores in the general election.
- Rep. Jeff Fortenberry (R-NE-1) resigned effective March 31. Nebraska state Sen. Mike Flood (R) won the special election on June 28 and will serve out the rest of Rep. Fortenberry's term.
- Rep. Anthony Delgado (D-NY-19) resigned in late May to become Lieutenant Governor of New York. Democrat Pat Ryan won the special election on August 23 and will serve for the remainder of the term.
- Rep. Tom Reed (R-NY-23) announced his retirement on May 10. Republican nominee Joe Sempolinski won the August 23 primary. He will also be on the ballot for the general election in November.
- Rep. Jackie Walorski (R-IN-2) passed away on August 3. Indiana Republican held a caucus on August 20 to nominate a candidate for both the special election to fill the remainder of Rep. Walorski's current term and the general election for a full term. Rudy Yakym won the GOP nomination for both the special and general election. Indiana democrats picked Paul Steury to face Yakym in the special election, which will coincide with the general election. Yakym is likely to win as the seat is historically red and he has received the endorsement of Rep. Walorski's husband.
- Rep. Charlie Crist (D-FL-13) announced he would be retiring from Congress early effective August 31. His seat will remain vacant until the November election.
- Rep. Ted Deutch (D-FL-22) announced he would be retiring from Congress early effective September 30.

## Democratic Leadership

- **Leadership: Speaker** Nancy Pelosi (D-CA), **Majority Leader** Steny Hoyer (D-MD), **Majority Whip** James Clyburn (D-SC), and **Assistant Speaker** Katherine Clark (D-MA) have all filed for re-election and have not given any indication publicly of their intention to step down from

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their leadership positions. However, if the House flips, we could see retirements and changes in party leadership. Speaker Pelosi's retirement would set off a chain reaction of leadership changes. **Democratic Caucus Chair** Hakeem Jeffries (D-NY) is favored to lead the caucus if **Speaker** Pelosi steps down, but the debate over leadership could expose gaps between progressives and moderates. If Rep. Jeffries moves into the top spot, there is chatter about **Majority Whip** James Clyburn (D-SC) remaining in the third spot. **Majority Leader** Steny Hoyer and **Intelligence Committee Chair** Adam Schiff (D-WA) are reportedly eyeing runs to succeed **Speaker** Pelosi; the latter has said in a September interview that he supports more "rapidly elevat[ing]" Members into leadership positions and enacting committee chair term limits. **Progressive Caucus Chairwoman** Pramila Jayapal (D-WA) and **Assistant Speaker** Katherine Clark (D-MA) may be interested in the **Whip** position. **Senior Chief Deputy Whip** Jan Schakowsky (D-IL) could remain in this position. **Senior Chief Deputy Whip** GK Butterfield (D-NC) is retiring. It is unclear who might replace him.

- **Democratic Caucus: Chairman** Hakeem Jeffries (D-NY) will be ineligible to continue in his position per caucus rules, which limit members to no more than two consecutive full terms. **Congressional Progressive Caucus Chairwoman** Pramila Jayapal (D-WA) has indicated interest in a leadership position, which could include an opening on the **Democratic Caucus** leadership roster, or the **Assistant Speaker** position held by Katherine Clark (D-MA). **Democratic Policy and Communications Co-Chair** Joe Neguse (D-CO) was particularly busy during August recess, suggesting he is positioning himself for the chairmanship. **Vice Chair** Pete Aguilar (D-CA) could continue in this position, as he will only have served one full term. However, it is widely believed that he will move up to the **Assistant Speaker** position if it becomes vacant. **Democratic Policy and Communications Co-Chair** Debbie Dingell (D-MI), and Reps. Madeleine Dean (D-PA), Joyce Beatty (D-OH) and Ted Lieu (D-CA) are competing for the **Vice Chair** position.
- **Democratic Policy and Communications Committee (DPCC): Co-Chair** Matt Cartwright (D-PA), **Co-Chair** Debbie Dingell (D-MI), and **Co-Chair** Ted Lieu (D-CA) would not be eligible to continue per caucus rules. **Co-Chair** Joe Neguse (D-CO) seems to be angling for Democratic Caucus Chair; however, if the Big Three -- **Speaker** Nancy Pelosi (D-CA), **Majority Leader** Steny Hoyer (D-MD) and **Majority Whip** Jim Clyburn (D-SC) -- decide to stay, Rep. Neguse may remain in his current position. Rep. Dean Phillips (D-MN) is interested in a seat.
- **Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee (DCCC):** It may be premature to speculate who may succeed current **Chairman** Sean Patrick Maloney (D-NY). Following New York's redistricting scramble, some House Democrats had suggested Rep. Maloney should be ousted; however, such a move is unlikely, given that he has Speaker Nancy Pelosi's (D-CA) support. In 2020, Rep. Tony Cardenas (D-CA) ran against Rep. Maloney, but he has not indicated any interest in running again. If Rep. Maloney doesn't run, it is likely that Rep. Ami Bera (D-CA) would run.

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- **Junior Caucus Leadership Representative (CLR):** CLR Colin Allred (D-TX) could continue in his current position. If reelected, Rep. Allred would be in his third term, meaning he would still be eligible to serve under caucus rules, which requires the **CLR** to have served five terms or less. In 2020, Rep. Allred narrowly defeated Rep. Jason Crow (D-CO) for the position, but he has not indicated interest in running again.
- **Democratic Steering and Policy Committee: Co-Chair** Cheri Bustos (D-IL) is retiring, creating an open co-chair slot. **Co-Chair** Barbara Lee (D-CA) and **Co-Chair** Eric Swalwell (D-CA) could continue to serve as co-chairs. Caucus rules are silent on number of chairs needed for the Steering Committee, meaning it would not have to be three co-chairs.

## Republican Leadership

- **Leadership:** The Hill today is very different from what it used to be, and our ability to predict key positions, including leadership, depends on the political environment, as well as the results of the election. If Republicans take control of the chamber, 117th Congress **Minority Leader** Kevin McCarthy (R-CA) will likely be elected **Speaker**, leaving 117th Congress **Minority Whip** Steve Scalise (R-LA) to become **Majority Leader**. As a reminder, the **Speaker** is not required to be a Member of the House. Candidates who are interested in the **Majority Whip** position if Rep. Scalise moves up include **RSC Chair** Jim Banks (R-IN), **National Republican Congressional Committee (NRCC) Chair** Tom Emmer (R-MN) and **Chief Deputy Whip** Drew Ferguson (R-GA). **Financial Services Committee Chairman** Patrick McHenry (R-NC) was seen as the top contender. However, he has stated he will remain in his top committee spot should Republicans win the majority. Rep. Ferguson has reportedly been most active in campaigning for the position.
- **Republican Conference (HRC): HRC Chair** Elise Stefanik (R-NY) confirmed in early September she is seeking another term as third-ranking Republican, despite previously vowing to serve just one term. Stefanik is also being floated around as a potential running mate for Trump in 2024. There were some rumors that Rep. Stefanik may have been looking to challenge Rep. Virginia Foxx (R-NC) for the top spot on the **Education and Labor Committee**, but it is all but certain she will remain in leadership. First-term Rep. Ashley Hinson (R-IA) is reportedly looking to run for the **HRC Chair** as is **HRC Vice Chair** Mike Johnson (R-LA), but neither present a serious challenge to Stefanik. **HRC Secretary** Richard Hudson (R-NC) could remain in this position, although it sounds like he may also be interested in the **National Republican Congressional Committee (NRCC) Chair** job. Rep. Kat Cammack (R-FL) and Lisa McClain (R-MI) are in a two-way race for **HRC Secretary**.
- **Republican Policy Committee (RPC): Chairman** Gary Palmer (R-AL) could continue to serve in this role, as his staff has already indicated he is beginning to plan for the 118th Congress.
- **National Republican Congressional Committee (NRCC): NRCC Chair** Tom Emmer (R-MN) is reportedly interested in the **Whip** position should Republicans take the majority. Rep.



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Richard Hudson (R-NC) and Rep. Darin LaHood (R-IL) are facing one another for the **NRCC Chair** position.

- **Republican Study Committee (RSC): RSC Chair** Jim Banks (R-IN) may run for **Whip** as **HRC Chair** Elise Stefanik has confirmed she will not, but he could also run for another leadership spot. The chairmanship will likely go to Rep. Kevin Hern (R-OK).

## General Rules Pertaining to Committee Leadership

- While Republicans have established party rules, Democrats regard these as longstanding informal practices.
- **Full Committees:** Neither party is bound by seniority. Both parties tend to consider merit, length of service to committee, commitment, and diversity when making nominations.
- **Subcommittees:** The caucus looks to seniority on the full committee as the primary factor for selecting subcommittee chairs, though there are other factors, like those listed above.
- Waivers and temporary committee assignments are permitted.
- Democrats and Republicans establish exclusivity and non-exclusivity for certain committees, with limitations.
- Exclusive Committees include Appropriations; Energy and Commerce; Financial Services; Rules; and Ways and Means.
- Generally, no Member is permitted to serve on more than one Exclusive Committee.
- Non-Exclusive Committees include Agriculture; Armed Services; Budget; Education and Labor; Foreign Affairs; Homeland Security; House Administration; Judiciary; Natural Resources; Oversight and Reform; Science, Space and Technology; Small Business; Transportation and Infrastructure; and Veterans' Affairs.

## Democratic Caucus Rules on Committee Leadership

- **Exclusive Committees:** A Democratic Representative can chair one committee and is generally precluded from being chair of any subcommittee, though there are exceptions. The chair of an Exclusive Committee cannot be a member of any other committee, again with exceptions. Vice Chairs of Exclusive Committees must be Members who have served less than five terms. A Vice Chair can only serve for one term.
- **Non-Exclusive Committees:** A Democratic Member can chair one committee and is generally precluded from being chair of any subcommittee, with exceptions. A Member who chairs a Non-Exclusive Committee can serve on a maximum of two committees. Vice Chairs of Non-Exclusive Committees must be Members who have served less than five terms. A Vice Chair can only serve for one term.

## Republican Caucus Rules on Committee Leadership

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- **Term Limits:** A Republican Member can serve a cumulative six years as chair and ranking member. In other words, six years as chairman constitutes a term limit, but so does four years as chairman and two years as ranking member on the same committee.
- **Exclusive Committees:** A Republican Member can chair one committee with exceptions. The six-year term limit applies. There are no restrictions on eligibility to serve as Vice Chair.
- **Non-Exclusive Committees:** A Republican Member can chair one committee with exceptions. The six-year term limit applies. There are no restrictions on eligibility to serve as Vice Chair.
- **Non-Standing Committees:** The six-year term limit applies to full committees and subcommittees.

**Outlook:** Due to 117th Congress **Budget** Chair John Yarmuth's (D-KY) retirement, it remains unclear who will take the spot on the committee in the 118th Congress. **Democratic Caucus Chair** Hakeem Jeffries (D-NY) is next in line by seniority, but it is believed he will pass on the role given his interest in succeeding **Speaker** Nancy Pelosi (D-CA), if she were to step down. 117th Congress **Budget** Ranking Member Jason Smith (R-MO) is seeking the top GOP spot on **Ways and Means**, but he faces a strong challenge against Rep. Vern Buchanan (R-FL). If he does not get the promotion, he will remain on **Budget**. Reps. Lloyd Smucker (R-PA) and Jodey Arrington (R-TX) are seeking **Budget** chairmanship in the 118th Congress, and Rep. Buddy Carter (R-GA) is considering a run.
