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Overview

Current Margins and the Electoral Map in the House

- The midterm elections were held November 8, 2022. 218 seats are needed to control the chamber, and while the exact number of seats each party will hold remains yet to be decided, Republicans will hold a slim majority. The 118th Congress will begin with reelected and newly elected Members beginning two-year terms on January 3, 2023.
- Throughout the cycle, 77 sitting Members have announced they will not be returning to the 118th Congress. Retirements, plans to seek a different office, or election defeats have been announced by 45 Democrats and 32 Republicans, including five Democratic committee chairs (Budget; Ethics; Oversight and Government Reform; Science, Space, and Technology; and Transportation and Infrastructure) and five Republican ranking members (Ethics; Homeland Security; House Administration; Ways and Means; and Select Committee to Investigate the Jan. 6th Attack on the U.S. Capitol).
- As the margins in the House become clear and we learn more about committee ratios, we plan to expand this document to reflect seats that parties may gain or lose on each committee, as well as current committee members who may be at risk of losing a seat due to changing committee ratios.
- We will also begin tracking Members who may be looking to switch their committee assignments in the new Congress.
- There had been reports that if Republicans win control of the House, GOP leadership might consider creating universal chamber rules that would limit committee leadership to three terms. This would impact long-serving Democratic committee leaders, including Reps. Bennie Thompson (D-MS) of **Homeland Security**, Adam Smith (D-CA) of **Armed Services**, Maxine Waters (D-CA) of **Financial Services**, Frank Pallone (D-NJ) of **Energy and Commerce**, and Bobby Scott (D-VA) of **Education and Labor**. That being said, in several cycles over the last decade, Republican leaders have proposed to relax party conference rules. Without an official comment from Minority Leader Kevin McCarthy (R-CA), it is questionable if this policy would be pursued.
- Before the election, some Democrats had come out in support of term limits, including Reps. Elissa Slotkin (D-MI), Dean Phillips (D-MN), Adam Schiff (D-CA), and John Yarmuth (D-KY). Democrats' Committee on Caucus Procedures will host a session to discuss new rules the week of November 14. Some Members, including Rep. Bill Foster (D-IL) have already sent proposals suggesting a six-year term limit. Any Member who wants to serve beyond the six years would need 50 percent of Members to support them in a secret-ballot vote. Other members, such as Reps. Colin Allred (D-TX) and Raul Ruiz (D-CA), support changes in the caucus, but haven't gone as far as to support term limits. Similar to Republicans, it is

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unlikely the reform will be pursued as the majority of support is within the New Democrat Coalition, rather than senior Members of the caucus.

Democratic Leadership

- **Leadership:** Republicans officially won the House on November 16, House Democrats will be in the minority, meaning they will have one less leadership position. On November 17, **Speaker** Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) announced her plans to step down from leadership while remaining in the House as a Member of Congress. **Majority Leader** Steny Hoyer (D-MD) also indicated he will step down from his role and return to serve as a member of the **Appropriations** Committee. Democratic leadership elections will be held on November 30; however, it is widely expected that **Democratic Caucus Chair** Hakeem Jeffries (D-NY) will be elected to lead the caucus as **Minority Leader**. Other Members could emerge as challengers, but so far, no one has made announcements. 117th Congress **Intelligence** Chair Adam Schiff (D-CA) was thought to have been interested in leadership, but he is likely setting himself up for a potential 2024 Senate run. **Assistant Speaker** Katherine Clark (D-MA) will likely be elected to become Minority Whip. **Majority Whip** James Clyburn (D-SC) has indicated his plans to run for **Assistant Leader** and will likely win the election. **Senior Chief Deputy Whip** GK Butterfield (D-NC) is retiring. It is unclear who might replace him, but **Democratic Policy and Communications Co-Chair** Joe Neguse (D-CO) have indicated interest in leadership positions.
- **Democratic Caucus: Chairman** Hakeem Jeffries (D-NY), who had been ineligible to continue in his position per caucus rules which limit members to no more than two consecutive full terms, is expected to succeed Speaker Pelosi (D-CA). 117th Congress Vice Chair Pete Aguilar (D-CA) is expected to become Caucus Chair in the next Congress. **Democratic Policy and Communications Co-Chair** Debbie Dingell (D-MI), and Reps. Madeleine Dean (D-PA), Joyce Beatty (D-OH), and Ted Lieu (D-CA) are competing for the **Vice Chair** position.
- **Democratic Policy and Communications Committee (DPCC): Co-Chair** Matt Cartwright (D-PA), **Co-Chair** Debbie Dingell (D-MI), and **Co-Chair** Ted Lieu (D-CA) are not eligible to continue per caucus rules. **Co-Chair** Joe Neguse (D-CO) may angle for a different leadership role. Rep. Chrissy Houlahan (D-PA) is running for a co-chair spot. Rep. Dean Phillips (D-MN) is also interested in a seat.
- **Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee (DCCC): DCCC Chair** Sean Patrick Maloney (D-NY) officially conceded to his Republican challenger following the general election. Rep. Maloney was elected DCCC Chair in late 2020. Both Reps. Tony Cardenas (D-CA) and Ami Bera (D-CA) announced they would be running for the spot. While it isn't clear who will take the top slot, Rep. Cardenas is backed by the Congressional Hispanic Caucus and is

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coming off of a challenge for the role against Maloney in 2020. The proposed change to make the **DCCC Chair** appointed is likely too late to be considered for this upcoming election cycle, as it will be especially important for Democrats to have a **DCCC Chair** and staff in place starting January 2023.

- It is unclear whether the role will remain an elected position or become an appointed role.
- **Junior Caucus Leadership Representative (CLR): CLR** Colin Allred (D-TX) could continue in his current position. If reelected, Rep. Allred would be in his third term, meaning he would still be eligible to serve under caucus rules, which requires the **CLR** to have served five terms or less. In 2020, Rep. Allred narrowly defeated Rep. Jason Crow (D-CO) for the position, but he has not indicated interest in running again.
- **Democratic Steering and Policy Committee: Co-Chair** Cheri Bustos (D-IL) is retiring, creating an open co-chair slot. **Co-Chair** Barbara Lee (D-CA) and **Co-Chair** Eric Swalwell (D-CA) could continue to serve as co-chairs. Caucus rules are silent on number of chairs needed for the Steering Committee, meaning it would not have to be three co-chairs.

Republican Leadership

- **Leadership:** 117th Congress **Minority Leader** Kevin McCarthy (R-CA) won the party nomination for **Speaker-designate** against challenger Rep. Andy Biggs (R-AZ) by a vote of 188-31. It is not until January that he has to win a majority of the full House, which gives him just over a month to convince his party members to support his bid for the job. As a reminder, the **Speaker** is not required to be a member of the House. 117th Congress **Minority Whip** Steve Scalise (R-LA) has been elected to become **Majority Leader** in the next Congress. 117th Congress **National Republican Congressional Committee (NRCC)** Chair Tom Emmer (R-MN) has been elected to become **Majority Whip**.
- **Republican Conference (HRC): HRC Chair** Elise Stefanik (R-NY) won another term to serve in the same position next Congress. Rep. Stefanik is also being floated around as a potential running mate for President Donald Trump in 2024. **HRC Vice Chair** Mike Johnson (R-LA) won another term unopposed. Rep. Lisa McClain (R-MI) will be the next **HRC Secretary**, succeeding Rep. Richard Hudson (R-NC)
- **Republican Policy Committee (RPC): Chairman** Gary Palmer (R-AL) was elected to serve another term in this role.
- **National Republican Congressional Committee (NRCC):** Rep. Richard Hudson (R-NC) was elected to the **NRCC Chair** position, succeed incoming **Majority Whip** Rep. Emmer.
- **Republican Study Committee (RSC):** 117th Congress **RSC Chair** Jim Banks (R-IN) lost To Rep. Kevin Hern (R-OK) in the race for **RSC Chair**.

General Rules Pertaining to Committee Leadership

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- While Republicans have established party rules, Democrats regard these as longstanding informal practices.
- **Full Committees:** Neither party is bound by seniority. Both parties tend to consider merit, length of service to committee, commitment, and diversity when making nominations.
- **Subcommittees:** The caucus looks to seniority on the full committee as the primary factor for selecting subcommittee chairs, though there are other factors, like those listed above.
- Waivers and temporary committee assignments are permitted.
- Democrats and Republicans establish exclusivity and non-exclusivity for certain committees, with limitations.
- Exclusive Committees include Appropriations; Energy and Commerce; Financial Services; Rules; and Ways and Means.
- Generally, no Member is permitted to serve on more than one Exclusive Committee.
- Non-Exclusive Committees include Agriculture; Armed Services; Budget; Education and Labor; Foreign Affairs; Homeland Security; House Administration; Judiciary; Natural Resources; Oversight and Reform; Science, Space and Technology; Small Business; Transportation and Infrastructure; and Veterans' Affairs.

Democratic Caucus Rules on Committee Leadership

- **Exclusive Committees:** A Democratic Representative can chair one committee and is generally precluded from being chair of any subcommittee, though there are exceptions. The chair of an Exclusive Committee cannot be a member of any other committee, again with exceptions. Vice Chairs of Exclusive Committees must be Members who have served less than five terms. A Vice Chair can only serve for one term.
- **Non-Exclusive Committees:** A Democratic Member can chair one committee and is generally precluded from being chair of any subcommittee, with exceptions. A Member who chairs a Non-Exclusive Committee can serve on a maximum of two committees. Vice Chairs of Non-Exclusive Committees must be Members who have served less than five terms. A Vice Chair can only serve for one term.

Republican Caucus Rules on Committee Leadership

- **Term Limits:** A Republican Member can serve a cumulative six years as chair and ranking member. In other words, six years as chairman constitutes a term limit, but so does four years as chairman and two years as ranking member on the same committee.
- **Exclusive Committees:** A Republican Member can chair one committee with exceptions. The six-year term limit applies. There are no restrictions on eligibility to serve as Vice Chair.
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- **Non-Standing Committees:** The six-year term limit applies to full committees and subcommittees.

Special Elections

- Rep. Devin Nunes (R-CA-22) announced his retirement in December 2021. Following a primary on April 5 with neither candidate claiming a majority, Republican Connie Conway won the special election runoff on June 7 to serve the remainder of the term. California is losing a district, and the current District 22 is largely being absorbed by neighboring districts, meaning Conway will only be in the seat until end of the 117th Congress.
- Rep. Jim Hagedorn (R-MN-1) passed away on February 18. Republican Brad Finstad won the special election on August 9 to serve the remainder of the term as well as the general election on November 8. He will be sworn into the 118th Congress in January.
- Rep. Don Young (R-AK-AL) passed away on March 18. A top-four special election primary was held on June 11. In a surprise win, Democrat Mary Peltola won the special election on August 30 and will carry out of the rest of the late Congressman's term. The result of the general election remains unclear.
- Rep. Filemon Vela (D-TX-34) resigned effective March 31. The historically Democratic seat was won by Republican Mayra Flores in a special election on June 14. She carried out the rest of his term and won the Republican primary for the district; however, she lost to Rep. Vicente Gonzalez (D-TX), who opted to run in District 34 instead of his current District 15, in the general election.
- Rep. Jeff Fortenberry (R-NE-1) resigned effective March 31. Nebraska state Sen. Mike Flood (R) won the special election on June 28 as well as the general election on November 8.
- Rep. Antonio Delgado (D-NY-19) resigned in late May to become Lieutenant Governor of New York. Democrat Pat Ryan won the special election on August 23; however, Rep. Ryan chose to run for re-election in the 18th District in the general election and won. He will be sworn into office in January.
- In New York's new 19th District, Republican Marc Molinaro claimed victory over Democrat Josh Riley and will be sworn into office in January. The seat was left vacant after Rep. Antonio Delgado (D-NY) was appointed as New York's lieutenant governor.
- Rep. Tom Reed (R-NY-23) announced his retirement on May 10. Republican Joe Sempolinski won the special election. However Republican Nick Langworthy beat Democrat Max Della Pia in the general election. Langworthy will be sworn into office in January.
- Rep. Jackie Walorski (R-IN-2) passed away on August 3. Indiana Republicans held a caucus on August 20 to nominate a candidate for both the special election to fill the remainder of Rep. Walorski's current term and the general election for a full term. Republican Rudy Yakym won the seat in special election as well as general election.

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- Rep. Charlie Crist (D-FL-13) announced he would be retiring from Congress early effective August 31. Republican Anna Paulina Luna flipped the seat and defeated Democrat Eric Lynn in the general election. Luna will be sworn into office in January.
- Rep. Ted Deutch (D-FL-22) announced he would be retiring from Congress early effective September 30. Democrat Jared Moskowitz won the general election and will be sworn into office in January.

Outlook: Due to 117th Congress **Budget** Chair John Yarmuth's (D-KY) retirement, it remains unclear who will take the spot on the committee in the 118th Congress. **Democratic Caucus Chair** Hakeem Jeffries (D-NY) is next in line by seniority, but it is believed he will pass on the role in order to **Speaker** Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) as the top Democrat in the House. Rep. Brendan Boyle (D-PA) has announced his run for the top Democratic spot of the **Budget** Committee. 117th Congress **Budget** Ranking Member Jason Smith (R-MO) is seeking the top GOP spot on **Ways and Means**, but he faces a strong challenge against Rep. Vern Buchanan (R-FL). If he does not get the promotion, he will remain on **Budget**. Reps. Lloyd Smucker (R-PA), Jodey Arrington (R-TX), and Buddy Carter (R-GA) are seeking **Budget** chairmanship in the 118th Congress, but Reps. Smucker and Arrington seem like favorites.

Outlook: 117th Congress **Education and Labor Committee** Chairman Bobby Scott (D-VA) will likely remain the top Democrat on the committee. 117th Congress **Education and Labor** Ranking Member Virginia Foxx (R-NC) is term-limited due to Republican Caucus Rules, which

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prevents GOP Members from serving as chair or ranking member of a committee for more than three consecutive terms. She has indicated she will request a term limit waiver; however, **Minority Leader** McCarthy (R-CA) has said he's not interested in granting waivers, meaning the top GOP spot could go to Rep. Tim Walberg (R-MI). With Rep. Jim Banks (R-IN) losing **Whip** race, he may seek the chairmanship as well. Rep. Glenn Thompson (R-PA), who currently chairs **Agriculture**, may be interested in switching to **Education and Labor**.
