Overview

Current Margins and the Electoral Map in the Senate

- There is currently a 50/50 split in the Senate. 51 seats are needed to control the chamber. Vice President Kamala Harris votes with Democrats to break a tie.
- The midterm elections will be held on November 8, 2022. The 118th Congress will begin with reelected and newly elected Senators beginning six-year terms on January 3, 2023.
- In this cycle, 35 of the 100 seats are up for regular election, including a special election in Oklahoma. 14 seats are held by Democrats and 21 are held by Republicans.
- As of today, six Senators have announced they will not seek re-election. This includes one Democratic committee chair (Appropriations) and five Republican ranking members (Appropriations; Armed Services; Banking; Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions (HELP); Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs (HSGAC); and Rules).
- Races to watch because they lean Democrat, lean Republican, or are toss-ups are coded in this document based on analysis from leading political pundits, including 270 To Win, Real Clear Politics, the Cook Political Report, and Sabato's Crystal Ball.
- As the margins in the Senate become clear and we learn more about committee ratios, we
 plan to expand this document to reflect seats that parties may gain or lose on each
 committee, as well as current committee members who may be at risk of losing a seat due
 to changing committee ratios.
- Closer to the elections, we will also begin tracking Senators who may be looking to switch their committee assignments in the new Congress.

Special Elections

- Sen. Jim Inhofe (R-OK) announced his retirement February 24. He will serve through the end
 of the 117th Congress. Republican Markwayne Mullin and Democrat Kendra Horn won their
 respective primaries on August 23 and will face each other in the special election. Since Sen.
 Inhofe filed for retirement before March 1, the state's special election will coincide with
 statewide races in November. Sen. Inhofe's successor will be sworn in to the 118th
 Congress on January 3.
- News broke on October 6th that Sen. Ben Sasse (R-NE) was a sole finalist University of Florida's presidency. Although the timing of his resignation remains unclear, if he officially announces, Nebraska Gov. Pete Ricketts will be responsible for appointing a replacement, with the seat then up for a special election in 2024.

Democratic Leadership

- No changes are expected to Senate Democratic leadership in the 118th Congress. However, this could change if Democrats perform poorly in November.
- **President Pro Tempore**: The president pro tempore is elected by the Senate and is, by custom, the Senator of the majority party with the longest record of continuous service. Since 117th Congress **President Pro Tempore** Patrick Leahy (D-VT) is retiring, the next longest serving Democrat would be Sen. Dianne Feinstein (D-CA).
- Leadership: Majority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY), Majority Whip Dick Durbin (D-IL), Chief Deputy Majority Whip Jeff Merkley (D-OR), and Assistant Democratic Leader Patty Murray (D-WA) will likely remain in these positions in the 118th Congress, assuming Democrats maintain control of the Senate, or hold similar positions in the minority, if the Senate flips.
- Democratic Caucus: Chair Chuck Schumer (D-NY), Vice Chair Elizabeth Warren (D-MA), Vice
 Chair Mark Warner (D-VA), and Secretary Tammy Baldwin (D-WI) could remain in their
 current positions.
- Democratic Policy & Communications Committee (DPCC): DPCC Chairwoman Debbie
 Stabenow (D-MI), DPCC Vice Chair Joe Manchin (D-WV), and DPCC Vice Chair Cory Booker (D-NJ) could continue in these roles in the 118th Congress.
- **Democratic Steering & Outreach Committee (DSOC): DSOC Chairwoman** Amy Klobuchar (D-MN) and **DSOC Vice Chairwoman** Jeanne Shaheen (D-NH) could remain in these positions in the next Congress.
- **Democratic Senatorial Campaign Committee (DSCC):** It may be too soon to speculate who will succeed current **DSCC Chairman** Gary Peters (D-MI).

Republican Leadership

- **President Pro Tempore**: If Republicans win control of the chamber in November, **President Pro Tempore Emeritus** Chuck Grassley (R-IA) would likely resume this position.
- Leadership: Minority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-KY), Assistant Minority Leader John
 Thune (R-SD), and Minority Chief Deputy Whip Mike Crapo (R-ID) will likely continue in
 these roles in the 118th Congress, or in similar roles in the majority if the Senate flips.
 National Republican Senatorial Committee (NRSC) Chair Rick Scott (R-FL) has not ruled out
 challenging Leader McConnell.
- Republican Conference (SRC): SRC Chair John Barrasso (R-WY) would likely remain in this position. Sen. Shelley Moore Capito (R-WV) has stated she will make a bid for the SRC Vice Chair spot, currently held by Sen. Joni Ernst (R-IA), who has indicated she is making a bid for retiring RPC Chair Roy Blunt's (R-MO) spot.

- Republican Policy Committee (RPC): Due to RPC Chair Roy Blunt's (R-MO) retirement, current SRC Vice Chair Joni Ernst (R-IA) has indicated she is looking to move into this position, opening up the SRC Vice Chair slot.
- National Republican Senatorial Committee (NRSC): Sen. Steve Daines (R-MT) is expected to succeed Sen. Rick Scott (R-FL) as NRSC Chair.

General Rules Pertaining to Committee Leadership

- Generally, decisions on Senate committee leadership are based on seniority, but there can be some surprises.
- Committee assignments are shaped by party conference rules. The Republican Conference makes its rule publicly available, while the Democratic Conference does not. Limitations apply to Republican Senators.
- The Senate categorizes committees into three groups: A Committees, B Committees, and C Committees.
- Both the Democratic and Republican Conferences have limitations on committee and subcommittee membership based on how a committee is characterized.
- Committee leadership rules are also impacted by further distinctions between A Committees as Super A Committees.
- A Committees include Agriculture; Appropriations; Armed Services; Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs; Commerce, Science, and Transportation; Energy and Natural Resources; Environment and Public Works (EPW); Finance; Foreign Relations; Intelligence; Judiciary; Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions (HELP); and Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs (HSGAC).
- Both the Democratic and Republican Conferences designate Appropriations, Armed Services, and Finance as Super A Committees. The Republican Conference also designates Foreign Relations as a Super A Committee.
- Senators are generally not assigned to more than one Super A Committee by their respective party conference, though there are some exceptions.
- Generally, a Senator is not permitted to serve on more than two A Committees.
- In February 2021, Senate Democrats adopted a new subcommittee chairmanship rule
 prohibiting Senators who lead A Committees from holding subcommittee chairmanships
 until more junior Members who do not lead a committee have an opportunity to claim a
 subcommittee gavel. There are some exceptions, notably on the Appropriations Committee.
- B committees include Aging; Budget; Joint Economic; Rules; Small Business; and Veterans' Affairs.
- C committees include Ethics; Indian Affairs; and Joint Taxation.

Republican Conference Rules on Committee Leadership

- **Full Committees:** Senators are not bound by committee seniority when selecting a chair. However, Republican Senators can use seniority to bump sitting chairs/ranking members when control of the Senate switches parties. If there are multiple candidates for a position, a vote is conducted by secret written ballot.
- *Term Limits:* A Republican Senator can serve a cumulative six years as chair, plus six years as ranking member of the same committee.
- A Committees: Senators rank their top three preferred A Committee assignments. The rest are composed using the following guidelines: seniority of service on committees, seniority of service in the Senate, limitations on any Senator serving on both the Finance and Appropriations Committees simultaneously, and rules that stipulate that no two Republican Senators from the same state can serve on the same committee.
- **B Committees:** Republican Senators may keep one B Committee assignment on which they served in the previous Congress.
- **Subcommittees:** Subcommittee chairs/ranking members are determined by their seniority on either the subcommittee or the full committee with exceptions. Waivers can be sought.

Outlook: 117th Congress Aging Chairman Bob Casey (D-PA) is likely to continue as the top Democrat on the committee in the 118th Congress. However, if 117th Congress Budget Chairman Bernie Sanders (I-VT) chooses not to move to the top spot on HELP, which will become vacant due to 117th Congress HELP Chairwoman Patty Murray (D-WA) moving into retiring 117th Congress Appropriations Chairman Patrick Leahy's (D-VT) spot, Sen. Casey (D-PA) would be next-in-line on HELP. If Sen. Casey moves to HELP, Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand (D-NY) would be next-in-line on Aging. 117th Congress Aging Ranking Member Tim Scott (R-SC) could remain the top Republican on the committee in the 118th Congress or he could choose to take the top GOP spot on Banking or Small Business. If Sen. Tim Scott chooses Banking or Small Business, Sen. Susan Collins (R-ME) would be next in line on Aging, but she is term limited and has indicated plans to become the top Republican on Appropriations. Next in line is Sen. Richard Burr (R-NC), who is retiring, followed by Sen. Marco Rubio (R-FL), who, if he wins reelection, is likely to keep the top Republican slot on Intelligence. This means Sen. Mike Braun (R-IN) could become the top Republican on Aging.

Outlook: Due to 117th Congress **Appropriations** Chairman Patrick Leahy's (D-VT) retirement, Sen. Patty Murray (D-WA) is in line to take the top Democratic spot on the committee, meaning she would vacate her spot as the top Democrat on **HELP**. Ranking Member Richard Shelby's (R-AL) retirement leaves Sen. Susan Collins (R-ME) as his expected successor, though some question if her party might find her to be too moderate.

Outlook: 117th Congress **Armed Services** Chairman Jack Reed (D-RI) will remain the top Democrat on the committee. Due to 117th Congress **Armed Services** Ranking Member Jim Inhofe's (R-OK) retirement, Sen. Roger Wicker (R-MS) has indicated he will take the top Republican spot on the committee in the 118th Congress.

Outlook: 117th Congress **Banking** Chairman Sherrod Brown (D-OH) will remain the top Democrat on the committee. Due to 117th Congress **Banking** Ranking Member Pat Toomey's (R-PA) retirement, next in line based on seniority would be Sen. Mike Crapo (R-ID). However, he is likely to keep his top spot on **Finance**. Next in line is 117th Congress **Aging** Ranking Member Tim Scott (R-SC). Sen. Tim Scott could be in a position to choose from the top spots on **Aging**, **Banking**, or **Small Business**. If Sen. Tim Scott chooses a committee other than **Banking**, Sen. Mike Rounds (R-SD) would be next in line to serve in the GOP leadership slot on **Banking**.

Outlook: If 117th Congress Budget Chairman Bernie Sanders (I-VT) moves into the top spot on HELP because of 117th Congress HELP Chairwoman Patty Murray (D-WA) moving to Appropriations, the chairmanship would open to next-in-line Sen. Sheldon Whitehouse (D-RI), assuming that all other Democratic Senators who are more senior maintain leadership slots on other committees. That being said, Sen. Sanders could retain his top spot on Budget leaving HELP to 117th Congress Aging Chairman Bob Casey (D-PA). If the Senate remains in Democratic control, 117th Congress Budget Ranking Member Lindsey Graham (R-SC) could give up the top Republican seat on Budget to move to Judiciary, where 117th Congress Judiciary Ranking Member Chuck Grassley (R-IA) is term-limited because he has already served six years as ranking member. If Sen. Graham moves to Judiciary, Sen. Grassley could move into the top GOP spot on Budget. If Republicans gain control of the Senate, Sen. Graham will likely become chairman of Budget and Sen. Whitehouse will become ranking member in the 118th Congress.

However, Sen. Lankford may have the opportunity to become the top Republican on **HSGAC**. Sen. James Risch (R-ID), who is next in line, is likely to continue to serve in the top GOP slot on **Foreign Relations**. Sen. Deb Fischer (R-NE) is on track to lead Republicans on **Rules** in the 118th Congress. This means Republicans might choose to shake up their **Ethics** roster to create an opportunity for an additional GOP Senator to lead a committee.

It is possible that Sen. Sanders may retain his position on Budget, meaning Aging Chairman Bob Casey (D-PA) would be next in line. Due to 117th Congress HELP Ranking Member Richard Burr's (R-NC) retirement, Sen. Rand Paul (R-KY) would be next in line to become the top Republican on the committee. To serve as the top Republican on HELP, Sen. Paul would have to give up his position as 117th Congress Small Business ranking member.
